
Born in Bristol in 1636, Edward Colston was a slave trader. He was a member of the Royal African Company. It is believed their ships transported 80,000 enslaved men, women and children from West Africa to the Americas. They were all branded with the company initials RAC. Any found weak, sick or dying were thrown overboard.

Stand with others tackling injustice, check they are OK, it means everything! You will not always get things right,


