Who are your real life heroes? Or role models? Who should we be remembering in our services, statues and museums? Does anyone get left out because history has not seen them?

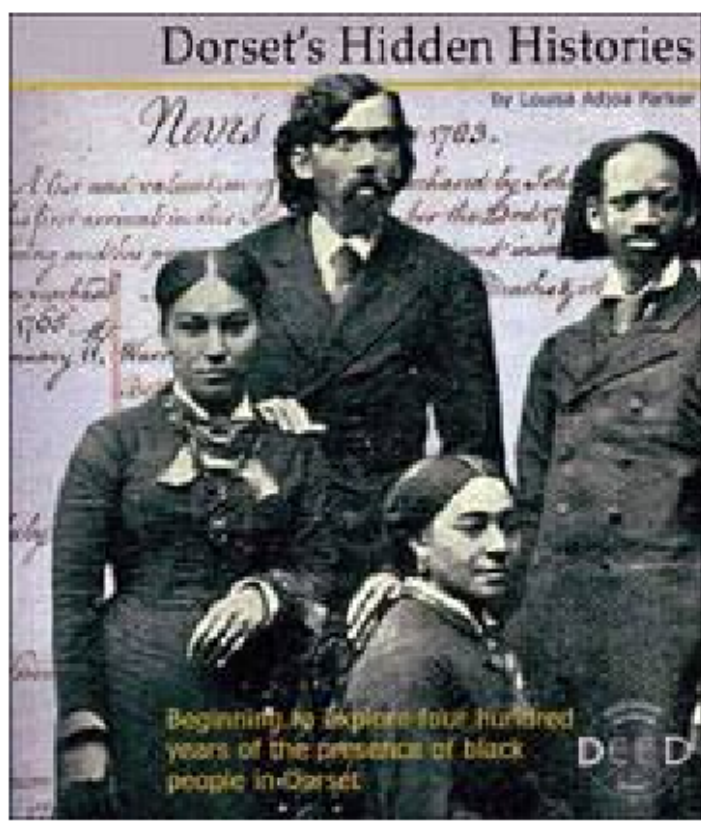
Until recently, not many of us had heard anything about Edward Colston. Here are a few facts.

Born in Bristol in 1636, Edward Colston was a slave trader. He was a member of the Royal African Company. It is believed their ships transported 80,000 enslaved men, women and children from West Africa to the Americas. They were all branded with the company initials RAC. Any found weak, sick or dying were thrown overboard.

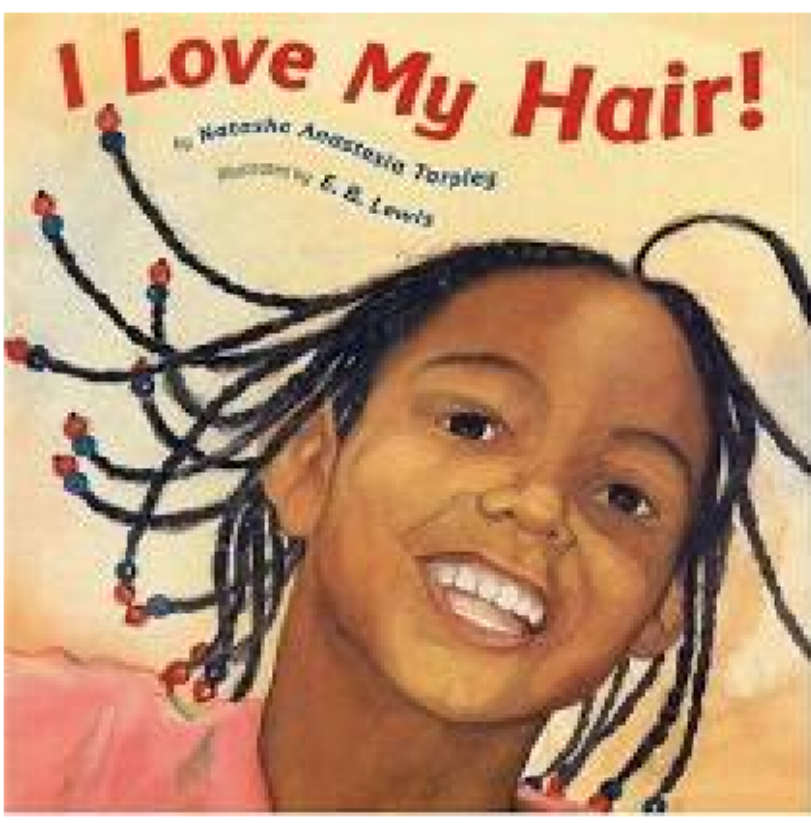
BECOME AN ALLY
